THE SACRAMENT OF THE EUCHARIST Continued

The institution of the Holy Eucharist at the Last Supper is recounted for us in the Gospels of Sts Matthew, Mark and Luke and by St Paul in 1 Corinthians. While some of the details vary in the different accounts, the gist is basically the same. At the Last Supper, which was the Jewish Passover meal, the Lord took bread which he declared to be his Body before giving it to the Apostles to eat, and took wine which he declared to be his Blood before giving it to them to drink. His body, he said, was being given up for them and his blood was being poured out for them and for many for the forgiveness of sins. We are not told one way or the other, but it is easy to imagine that at this point the minds of disciples returned to the words spoken by the Lord in synagogue at Capernaum and that things suddenly fell into place. If what the Lord was now saying was true, then it would be under the signs of bread and wine that they would eat his flesh and drink his blood. There would be no cannibalism or the drinking of physical human blood, but a mysterious transformation of these material things into the Body and Blood of the Lord. It would be under the guise of bread and wine that the food for eternal life would be consumed and, furthermore, this would happen each time they carried out this action in memory of him. However, in the words spoken by the Lord at the Last Supper another dimension is added. The indication is given that the body of Jesus is to be broken and 'given up' and that the wine is to be 'poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins'. This is sacrifical language. The bread and wine will only become the Body and Blood of the Lord when they are used in commemoration of the sacrifice he will make on Calvary the following day and in commemoration of his Resurrection three days later. It is this sacrifice of the cross that gives validity and force to the actions and words at the Last Supper, and in turn it is those words that provide the rationale for what Christ would do on the cross. The Last Supper and Christ's sacrifice on the cross interpret one another and, for that reason, are inseparable from each other.
