#### THE SACRAMENT OF THE EUCHARIST Continued

The command of Jesus at the Last Supper to 'Do this in memory of me' indicates that this memorial of his Death and Resurrection was to be a liturgical event. Why? Because the context in which it was celebrated was itself a liturgical act. The Passover meal was deeply ritual. Certain foods had to be eaten; there was a set number of glasses of wine to be consumed in a particular order; certain Psalms had to be sung. At the same time, the early celebrations of the Eucharist did not mirror exactly the Passover meal as the Eucharist was celebrated weekly, on the Lord's Day, and not just once a year on the Passover. So wherever Christians gathered to share food in memory of Christ, which food would certainly have included the essential bread and wine used by Him, it was a Eucharistic celebration. The passage from the Acts of the Apostles quoted previously, along with St Paul's admonitions to the Corinthians, show this to be the case. The earliest account we have of the basic structure of the Mass as it emerged, and which endures to this day, is found in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Century writings of St Justin Martyr. It followed the basic form of the community coming together; readings from the Prophets and the 'memoirs of the Apostles' followed by a homily; the Offertory and collection for the poor and needy; the Eucharistic Prayer of thanksgiving which was improvised by the celebrant; Holy Communion, some of which was taken by deacons to the sick and others who were unable to be present. At this time, Holy Communion was received under the species of both bread and wine. As time went on, the prayers and readings of the Mass become more formalised and liurgical books were compiled for the convenience of priests and choirs. From about the time of the Emperor Constantine's conversion, the celebration of the Mass moved into purpose-built church buildings which lent themselves to the further ritualisation of the liturgy, with prayers and rites being added gradually over time, something often described as organic development.
