LIVING THE EASTER TRIDUUM

It is hard to deny that in recent decades our concept of 'sacred time' has diminished somewhat. Important days and seasons in our Church's weekly and yearly cycle seem no longer to be observed as they used to be. Even honouring Sunday as the Lord's Day has, for many, been reduced to mere attendance at Mass, the remainder of the day often being like any other, or a day on which to get odd jobs done. And so if spending Sunday as it ought to be spent is something we find more and more challenging, how much more true will it be of the days that are ahead of us this week; the days on which we recall the central events of our Faith with particular intensity? Will we be able to live these days in a way that marks them as particularly sacred to us? Attendance at ceremonies is of course the first and most important step, but is there more we can do and, if so, what might it be?

On Thursday evening at the Mass of the Lord's Supper, Lent will end and the Sacred Triduum will begin. Let us endeavour to spend these few days in a more reflective way than normal by keeping distractions at bay where possible, especially on Good Friday, that most solemn of days. While not everybody might have a lot of spiritual material on their bookshelves to read, the internet has no shortage of articles, podcasts and videos that some imaginative Googling and YouTubing will root out! For those who have Sky etc. the Catholic channel EWTN (Sky 588) will have a rich schedule of programming for adults and children that could help us to reflect more deeply on the meaning of these days. Likewise Radio Maria. And so forth. As Catholics living in an increasingly secularised society, it is more incumbent on us than ever to push the boat out and mark our sacred days clearly by doing/not doing certain things. The Easter Triduum, as the high point of our year, is as good a time to begin as any.
